

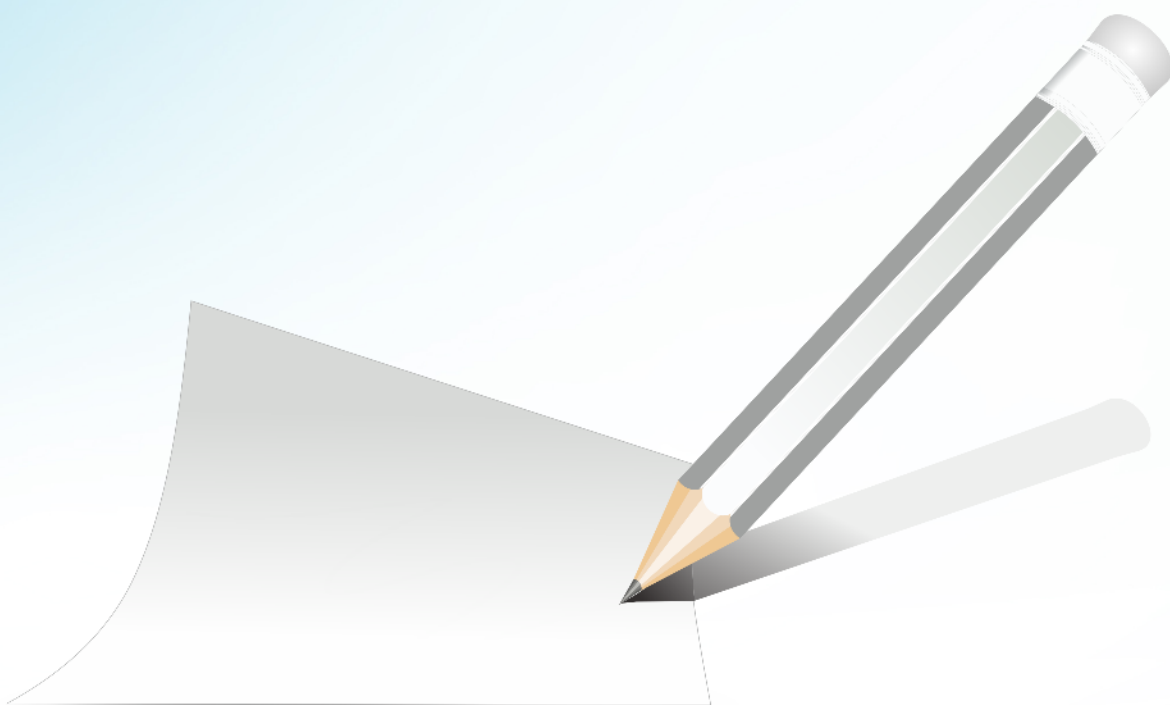

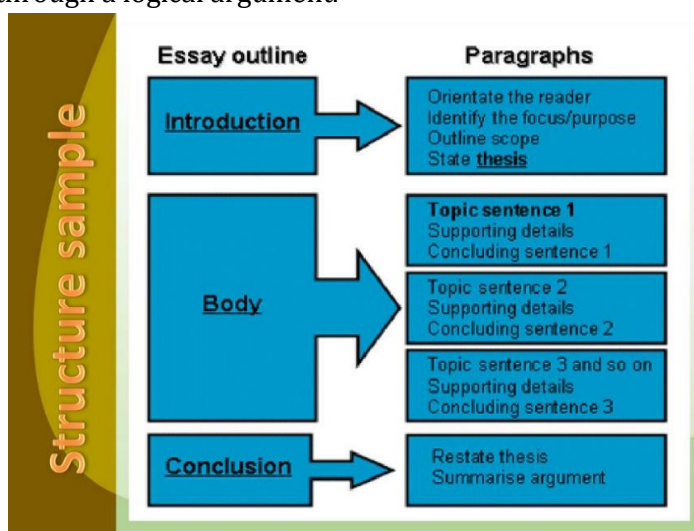


Figure 1. The Structure of En Essay

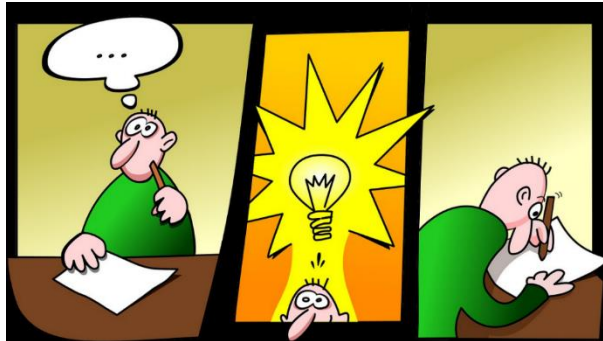
